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Photographer sets town to lights in exhibition

Another is "Faces of Chicago" where Hirsch depicted famous and not so famous Chicagoans in different stages of life, from baby to toddler, to grandmother and granddaughter. People from various ethnic groups are also included. For many years, Hirsch was known primarily for her depictions of the great Chicago boat races. For the Millennium celebration, where two guests from every country in the world were invited, she photographed the vast empty

dining room at McCormick place before the guests arrived. Glass sculptor Dale Chihuly was also there, checking his chandeliers, put together with the help of students from Gallery 37. Hirsch also leads a yearly Holiday walk. This year it was to Millennium Park where she photographed the ice rink and the Columns. Although it was before her time, she divulged that the Columns used to be there in 1937. As luck would have it, I happened to view Hirsch's exhibit at the time of the St. Patrick Day's

festivities. On stage were young ladies, starting at about age 8, wearing gorgeous costumes of many colors, made for them in Ireland. They were followed by a large chorus of men and women.
